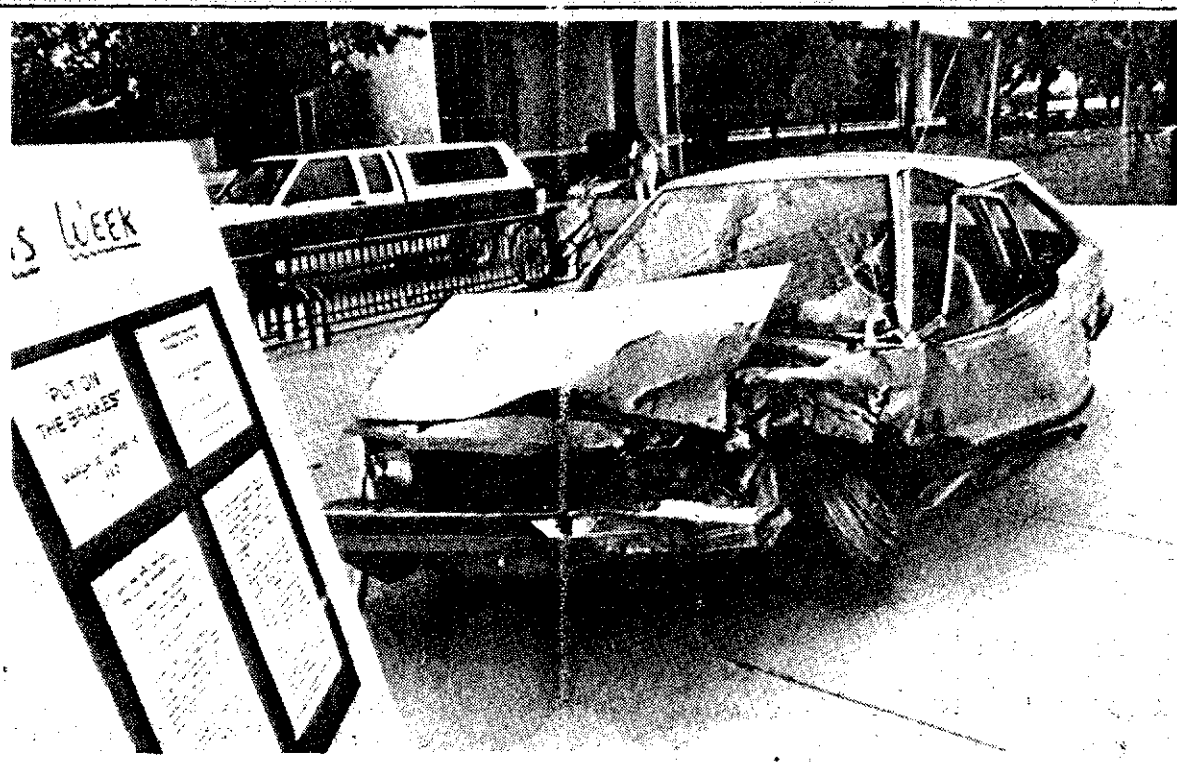

Filing deadline Friday; at least 3 strong slates preparing for big battle

A sneak preview of what may lie in store for next year's ASCC student government could be revealed at an open forum for Student Body Presidential candidates Tuesday, April 7, at 11 a.m.

The election is during the first week after Spring break on April 22-23.

Three slates are in the running after AHORA president Danylle Williams was impeached and is unlikely to enter the race.

When asked if she would still run Williams said, "I had thought about running, but I had decided before this incident not to."

The untimely impeachment and rumors of conflicts with club officers would have made her virtually unelectable, according to observers.

The remaining candidates, Student Senator James Brown, student Senator Eddie Luy, and Cabinet member Helen Reyes are expected to present their platforms and debate the voter concern at the open forum where Talon Marks reporters and ASCC Court Justices will be on hand to ask them pertinent campus related questions.

Reyes and running mate Aladdin Nabulsi, who are endorsed by current Student Body President Mazen Nabulsi, appear to be strong front-runners at the time.

James Brown and slate companion Melinda Claire, a vocal student Senator, may give Reyes and Nabulsi a close race, due to the fact that Brown

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AHORA 'impeaches' president Williams

AHORA, a usually dominant student organization force on campus, took another devastating blow this week, leaving the club submerged in unwanted controversy, and in what members hope is the final phase of a long series of frequent inner-club conflicts.

AHORA president and residing Homecoming Queen Danylle Williams has been impeached, in what she says is an illegal procedure.

An inner-club vote ousted her last Tuesday.

Club Vice President Sergei Agalzoof initiated the impeachment proceedings for what sources say was Williams' absences at meetings, as well as alleging that she "stifled the club motivation."

Williams responded to the charges saying that she had only missed two meetings, and that she encouraged participation from members in activities, but got response from less than half of the club.

Williams also claims that the impeachment proceedings were not written in the by-laws.

"The constitution doesn't say anything about rules for impeachment," said Williams.

It's been no secret that over the past two years AHORA has had continuing leadership problems.

This semester the organization saw their membership go from over 60 to less than 25 members to date.

Some claim that the demise of what was once the most powerful and influential organization on campus is due to the "leadership incompetence" which they say has shadowed the club over the past two years.

One former AHORA member candidly said that he quit the club because

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of the "disorganization within the inter-club leadership."

Williams blames some of the lack of club moral and its activity problems on Vice President Agalzoff.

Williams stated that Agalzoff "purposely undermined" what the other officers were trying to do, and that he caused the "disunity" of the club members.

She states that Agalzoff was a force in hindering the club from running as smoothly as it may have.

Williams went on to say Agalzoff integrated implied laws into the club's constitution, and at the two meetings he ran in her absence, he approved proposals without first checking with

off a heated discussion, claiming that the Affirmative Action Committee was not doing its job.

Lopez Charged that "Cerritos College is not meeting its requirements for affirmative action hiring," when in actuality last year the college's new hires were 40% minorities, according to personnel reports, when the state only has a suggested 30%.

According to Cecil Medina, the Multi-cultural director, "Lopez is an hourly employee of the Center in the capacity of liason worker between EOPS and the school. His lobbying is on his own and his opinions are by no means the opinions of the Center or myself."

When asked why she thought the majority of the members voted to impeach her, Williams commented, "It was a personality thing. They said I was restricting what they could do, but when I told them they could do it, no one did anything."

When Williams was questioned why Corinne Martinez, the club's advisor didn't step in she said, "She was not vocal at most of the meetings. She just sat there not active and observed. She knew the situation, and she did nothing."

Martinez did not return a call for her input.

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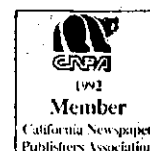
