Magnuson named acting President

Magnuson, long-time Assistant Superintendent and Vice President for Business Services, took the appointment as Acting Interim President not to exceed a year.


Martinez will officially leave July 3, although he reportedly will take vacation time immediately.

NO COST FACTORS FIGURED

Faculty settles for no salary hike

The Cerritos College Faculty and the Board of Trustees have agreed on a 1992 contract focusing primarily on three no cost items with no actual salary increases for the professors.

The contract still includes health and welfare insurance coverages for faculty at their existing levels.

The first of the three is to include the salary schedule and all compensation items currently printed in the faculty handbook.

The second is to establish the teaching hours for overload teaching to correspond to the new innovative class scheduling so that the extra classes can be taught at more convenient hours.

Basically teaching beyond 15 units a semester is considered an overload. Faculty may teach a maximum six units overload per semester.

Previously those at the top of these last two columns had taken six units for a four year term increase.

Now they get credit for the equivalent 100 hours of professors growth over the same period.

The final item includes incentive increments for columns E and F in the faculty salary schedule to longevity professors.

Tuition may be hiked for community college

Higher education may very soon equate to a higher price.

Bottom line: Tuition may go up \$4 a unit, for a maximum of \$100 instead of the now \$6 a unit and \$60 maximum structure.

State Community College Chancellor David Mertes is heading a group looking to make education ends meet in these especially trying recession times.


One way for a lot of money to be raised for community colleges is to up tuition and fees.

Controversial faculty CCFA election to stand as counted

After over a month long battle, it looks like Donna Miller will finally be given the position she won during an officers election for the Community College Faculty Association.

The election committee made up of Darryl Beale, Trudy Peralta and Allen Seigel, recommended last Wednesday that the results of the election stand as first recommended.

Miller beat out last year's secretary Bob Renteria for the presidential position.

Shortly after the election results had been posted, the inauguration of the officers was delayed due to what some Association officials described as, "Some irregularities in the voting process."

In a letter, Dr. George Jaeger called the irregularities a "fraud."

Jaeger clarified himself saying, "Drs. Pribble and Wilkoff asked Gretchen Hoad and Bonnie Ideal (and

several other faculty, I believe) if they could have their proxy to vote in the CCFA election. Pribble and Wilkoff informed Hoad and Ideal whom they would vote for and Hoad and Ideal consented."

"The fraud I mentioned was discovered when Drs. Pribble and Wilkoff went to sign the voting roster and then discovered the Mrs. Hoad's and Mrs. Ideal's signatures or initials written in next to their names were not theirs."

In an earlier letter, Jaeger asked for another election to be held.

The final results stand with Miller as President over Bob Renteria. John Baley won the vice presidential seat over incumbent Camil Weigel. Bill

Donroe defeated George Jaeger for Secretary, and Charles Betz took treasurer over Isabel Igan.

A \$150 entry fee is required for the fund raiser. This includes lunch, dinner, green fee, tee prizes, cart, on-course beverages and door prizes.


The winners will be announced at the evening awards ceremony.




Matinees June 21 and 28 are scheduled for 2:30.






PORSCHE PRICEY?—The rich, racy Porsche has become the poor, pricey Porsche. Sales have dropped dramatically because of a culmination of the recession, luxury taxes, careless production costs and Porsche's dedication to keeping its car in the ultra-exclusive market. In the U.S., sales went from 30,500 in 1986 to a dismal 4,400 in 1991. Porsche prices range from \$40,000 to \$99,000. However, to help boost sales, Porsche is working on a new entry-level car to be launched in 1995. Its price is expected to be a mere \$30,000.

NO SCHOLAR DOLLARS—Massive budget cuts have instructors, management and staff employees alike at Cal State Northridge preparing for temporary lay-offs and a cancellation of nearly 900 classes. President James W. Cleary said that if it gets any worse, CSUN will be out of business.


FREEWAY CAMERAS—Closed circuit cameras may soon be a part of our freeway system. An \$8.7 million plan is expected to be approved by the California Transportation Commission. The cameras would provide visual verification to gather information about accidents, delays and weather conditions so emergency crews could respond more quickly. The 47 cameras would cover 35 miles of freeway through Los Angeles, Burbank, Glendale and Santa Clarita.

NON-HOMERS—The Japanese have bought American again. The Seattle Mariners was sold to a group backed financially by Hiroshi Yamauchi, President of Nintendo. He will be providing \$75 million of the \$125 million purchase price. Yamauchi says that although the transaction was "significant" in that it is the first involving Japanese ownership of an American team, he "never intended to seek merit arising from the purchase of the club" and said his investment "is in every respect passive."

CANCER "PUSHERS"—Volunteers are being sought by the American Cancer Society for the Second Annual Making Strides Move-Along-A-Thon on June 20. Participants will push hospital beds around El Dorado Park in Long Beach. The funds raised will be used for research programs, education and services for patients and their families. For information, call 310-437-0791.

NO VOTE-NO VOICE—Some 36 percent of eligible voters in the 18-24 age bracket cast their ballots in the last Presidential election. With the 26th Amendment, ratified in 1971 the voting age was lowered from 21 to 18. The next election year saw nearly 50 percent of those eligible, voting.

Since 1972, when United States teenagers first became eligible to vote, fewer and fewer have been exercising their right to vote. A recent poll found 61 percent said they probably wouldn't vote. They claimed they were "turned off by government." The largest stumbling block may very well be the registration requirement at least for now. You have to register if you want to vote. Whatever the reasons for young people not voting, various concerned groups have been trying to reverse the trend. —JG
