The fight for four seats on the Board of Trustees is heating up with less than two weeks before the voting booths cool down the surprising intensity of what has shaped up as an all-out battle.

They really packed them in...

The Oct. 17 Board of Trustees candidates' forum saw incumbents Ruth Banda, John Moore, Katie Nordbak, along with Board hopefuls Ted Edmiston, Theresa Lambros, Mary Loya, Ada Steenhoek, and Marty Supple there answering questions from the audience.

Members of the student body, the community, and a group of "Concerned Faculty" were on hand to get the sparks flying.

Hot items covered such areas as the budget, communication between the faculty and the administration, the number of administrators compared to students and faculty, transfer rate, cost of textbooks, Board policy, and campaign contributions.

Nordbak bemoaned the new political activity surrounding this election.

"This election has become so political, you can't just stand back and run on your record. This election I have had to pay for mailings. We've — the three incumbents — are facing a tough fight to keep their seats, gotten involved in this election with other individuals because there's so much potential coming from the CTA pact," she said.

She was referring to the heavy campaigning by the faculty group which has amassed a sizeable campaign chest.

Supple countered with, "The political process isn't bad, this is the way life is."

finger at somebody else when they really don't have all the information," said Banda, who pretty much echoed everybody's feelings.

In fact, as observers have suggested, that's what the fireworks were all about.

The threat to the incumbents by the highly active Concerned Faculty is based on differing interpretations of what's been going down.

"In executive matters, we are discussing lawsuits, personnel matters, and negotiations. Everyone is suspicious that we are doing all this stuff behind closed doors. There's nothing happening behind those doors," Nordbak said about the challenge raised on closed sessions during the Board meetings.

A meeting-by-meeting breakdown of Board Executive sessions since Oct. 2 of last year reveals that the Trustees spent 56.52% of the meeting time in "closed sessions," according to figures compiled by the Concerned Faculty.

New Board hopefuls are not letting incumbent claims go unchallenged.

Three incumbent seats plus the one left vacated by Harold Tredway's retirement are up for grabs in what could mark a significant change in the Cerritos College picture.

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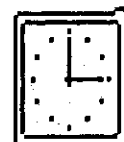

The women's volleyball team have turned into road Warriors as they went into El Camino and Long Beach City with no mercy beating both of them to improve their overall record to 11-3 and 2-0 in conference.

Cerritos will host East LA tonight and take their road show to Mt. San Antonio Friday night.

After a first set trouncing the Vikings lanced back in the second set with a 7-0 start only to see Cerritos take the lead and lose at the end.

The Falcons took out their frustration in the third set pounding out a 15-2 decision.

In the fourth set the two teams battled to an eight-eight tie before Cerritos pulled away with an impressive 15-9 win.

Cindy Paulson turned in a great performance with seven kills and 42 assists through the four sets.

Falcons hope to snap six-game streak

The football team will try to snap a six game losing streak against the defending Mission Conference Champion El Camino Warriors Saturday at 7 on the road.

Since the Northern Mission Conference Division aligned back in 1988 the Warriors have been King of the Hill.

The Falcons (3-2) go into the game prepared and rested since they had a bye last week.

The Warriors (3-3) on the other hand are coming off a 33-26 loss to the Fullerton Homets.

El Camino has a lot of offensive weapons to be reckoned in running back Mark Harper who leads the conference in scoring and quarterback Rodney Anderson who has thrown over 600 yards in limited time.
