

King jury "verdict" reaction will tell just who is the "jury"

We all wait with some nervousness for the verdict in the Rodney King civil rights trial.

We have already been inconvenienced by rumors of a verdict of acquittal.

We have legitimate fear for the security of our community, our property, and our loved ones.

More than that, we fear for the very fabric of our society.

We have all heard that there has been a run on gun shops in the last few months and that the police feel stolen guns are being stockpiled for use in the rioting that will follow an unpopular verdict.

No one wants the wholesale destruction -- the looting, burning, and inhumanity that rioting brings.

Injuries and loss of life can be assessed immediately. The dollar value of property destroyed can be assessed very soon after the fact.

The long-range loss of city revenues, due to destruction of tax-generating businesses and decreased tourism, can only

be estimated, but will surely be in the hundreds of millions.

These material losses are nothing compared to the damage we risk to our system of justice,

Twelve citizens are sitting in judgement on this case. They, and only they, are privy to the complete presentation of

If we tolerate rioting and anarchy after an unpopular verdict, we, in effect, are saying the jury trial is discarded as valueless, opting for verdicts by popular vote in criminal cases.

This would mean that no case would ever close as long as the accused had enemies or even opposition.

We must not second guess the jury in this case, or, for that matter, in any case. We must trust the jury, "the 12 good men and true," to mete out justice fairly, based on the evidence and the law.

If we allow rioting in the face of an unpopular verdict, we are excusing anarchy, promoting vigilantism, and rending the fabric of justice, which has thus far managed to clothe us....

Friends and family of the award winners, as well as the general public are invited to attend the event.



Tram runs for dark back lots

A new free tram service will make your trek through poorly lighted parking areas a lot safer.

Due to assualts on campus, the tram system has been developed to provide a safer environment for students.

At a cost of \$19,700, the tram is able to carry 22 passengers, plus the driver and a TCO (traffic control officer) who is in radio contact with the campus police.

The tram does not drop passengers off at their cars. It travels a predetermined route, and observes the people as they walk to their destinations.

Having started operation on March 20, the tram leaves the parking lot in

front of the campus police station at 5:30 p.m., Monday through Thursday.

It makes five stops as it travels all the way around Lot C-10, crosses Falcon Way and stops at the Art Gallery.

Continuing down the walkway, it stops at the Student Center, at the book store where it turns right and makes three stops in Lot C-1.

This one way trip takes 26 minutes and then returns to the campus police station by the same route. The tram stops operation at 11p.m.

Since this shuttle is new, it will drop off passengers anywhere, but the goal is to establish a regular route. Also, the route may change depending on what the students want.

Putting additional trams into operation has been discussed, but no decisions have been made.





Catch special artists interpretation, coverage of the LA riots in Art Gallery by Thursday

Ever wondered how some Latinos recovered from the trauma of the L.A. riots? Or how they expressed some of their frustrated sentiments over it?

The Best of Self-Help Graphics," a collection consisting of East L.A. Chicano-interpretive silk screen works, will be on exhibit in the Fine Arts Gallery in AC-50, from now through tomorrow.

These colorful and imaginative works cover everything from pictorial incidents from the L.A. riots to general life in the United States, as seen through the eyes of diverse-background, [unknown and inter-

nationally-known] Lating artists.

Art Department Chairman Kirk Miller instigated the exhibit here, believing they are "good works of art," and that it's good to "step outside of [your] own personal interests ... and see surrounding [works];" considering them "conceptual-

The works represent an outgrowth of Self-Help Graphics' Silkscreen Atelier Program of East Los Angeles, a community-based visual arts center with a mission to support and develop Latino

artists, in addition to promoting Chicano culture.

Self-Help Graphics & Art had its originations about 17 years ago through the efforts of Sister Karen Boccalero, a Franciscan artist, who saw the need for making the Chicano community artistic silkscreening expression accessible.

Works from the Exhibition Print Program at Self-Help Graphics have been successfully displayed in Mexico, Ireland, Australia, and other major cities in this country, including San Francisco, San Antonio, Austin, and Sacramento.

The Fine Arts Gallery is open Monday through Thursday, 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., and 6 to 9 p.m; closed Fridays. Admission is free to the general public.
