Closely guarded choice revealed Tuesday night; ASCC 923-261 runaway

Friday, students Aladdin Nabulsi and Daisy Mae Uy Kimpang garnered the headlines when they both were voted the new Associated Student Body President/Vice President for next year.

Tuesday, in a surprising announcement, the Board of Trustees made what observers are calling a huge stride toward stability of the college, when 47 year old Dr. Fred Gaskin was introduced as the new campus President.

Gaskin, a former Executive Vice President of Ivy Tech College in Indiana will replace interim Walter Magnuson.

"I'm here for the students. I'm honored to be president of Cerritos College," stated Gaskin.

"All I ask is commitment from everyone, it's not a one man job."

Nabulsi and Kimpang said, "We will continue to fight increases in student fees, as well as improve campus safety."

Gaskin will start his four-year reign in July.

Durant blasts Board, resigns

Seven-year veteran Mark Durant resigned from the Board of Trustees Tuesday after refusing to be "a party to the demise of this institution."

Durant charged that "if you're not going to act, you're doomed to suffer the consequences."

The Board is expected to appoint a fill-in until the September election.

Faculty has 'urgent' meet Thursday

"Items of a...urgent nature" will be discussed at tomorrow's general faculty meeting Thursday, April 29 called by the Faculty Senate and the Faculty Association at 11 a.m. in the Burnight Center.

Topics of discussion will include the community college budget, salary concerns, the interim accreditation report, and the Presidential selection process.

The previous general faculty meeting relating to "curriculum reform," has been cancelled.

Under the gun from Governor Pete Wilson's proposed budget that would affect 107 junior colleges in the state, the fate of Cerritos College's own fiscal budget of \$45 million is under consideration as to where cutbacks would be made.

She didn't believe him.

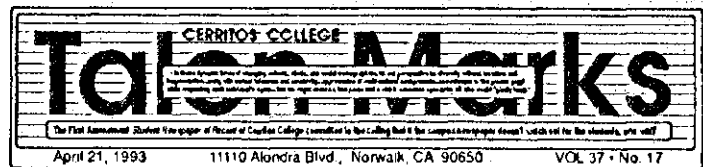
Daniel receives word that Helen was hit by a pick-up truck while crossing the street and isn't expected to live.
