Record 70 battle today, Thursday for 33 ASCC Student Senate seats

Interest in campus politics has ignited, setting a 10 year record with an astounding 70 Student Senate candidates handing in petitions.

The unusually large ballot spurred the hopes of Student Government officials that the huge ticket will promote a healthy voter

turnout at the polls today and tomorrow.

Polling booths will be located in front of the coffee shop, next to the Social Sciences building, and near the Health Sciences building.

Students must have a valid Cerritos College ID card to vote. Booths will be open at 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., and again at 6 p.m. to 9 p.m.

The ballot is headed by Athletics

who have 10 candidates running as independents.

The campus honor society, AGS, has the next largest slate with seven.

Three clubs, MeChA, AHORA, and the Black Student Union each have six candidates on the ballot.

Lambda Alpha Epsilon is the next in size with four candidates.

This month would be a time to salute our past history, if it weren't for the dismal situation that we're in.

I'm not knocking the idea that President Nixon set aside a month for our cultural pride, but sometimes it almost seems like a bunch of bologna.

Then again, it shouldn't have to be that way. At Cerritos College, however, it's a different story. It just so happens that the campus is surrounded by Latino rival street gangs.

The infamous Norwalk-Artesia-Hawaiian Gardens rivalry is right up there with the East L.A. wars.

It's been a stumbling block for our Hispanic leaders who have not been able to find a solution.

Nevertheless, it is these battles on the local level that taint a heritage that we've been so proud of.

On the national level there's not much that can be said. Although there are large Hispanic populations throughout the country's major cities, it has yet to translate into political power.

Neither is there any one identifiable leader that has a message for our young people. The words of those who have lost touch with the people are rendered insignificant.

There's a lack of unity among U.S. Puerto Ricans, Cubans, Mexicans and Central Americans. There has to be a way that if there is some sort of cooperation among us, that we can help each other out.

So, because there is no strong leadership, there is also no unity or vision. And people without a vision perish.

What makes changes? Economic and political power. The less educated you are, the less you vote. Therefore, education should be the primary focus.

If the economic base and education level are not enhanced, then you can expect more of the same problems that plague our communities.

If tuition hikes by Wilson's budget cuts make it harder to become educated, then it is only an obstacle and is counterproductive to solving America's growing cancer: poverty and violence.

The future is supposed to look brighter and this month is like an anniversary that acknowledges the past. But we must look forward. We need to add to our heritage...to supersede what's already transpired.

The challenge of our generation of students is to face our situation and win. To become the solution to the barrio and recognize the correlation between economics, education and politics.

Cesar Chavez fought bravely for the farm workers, but 25 years later all we have is a union. Boycotting grapes is worthless to kids growing up in Norwalk. We need a new leadership that will convert the youth into a political power base.

On Sept. 16 Mexican-Americans celebrate Mexico's independence day. But physical independence is useless unless you have a good leadership and an educated populace.

Let us try to not celebrate the historical past—because you can't really change or enjoy that. Instead, let's triumph in that we can make history.

Only then can you have the real joy of observing Hispanic Heritage Month.

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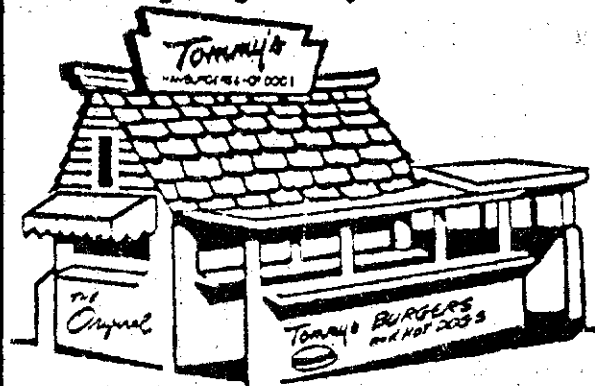
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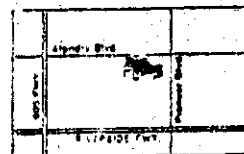


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
