
The directors have a variety of different backgrounds and theater experience. Each of the acts are performed by students that auditioned.

Cerritos takes second in tourney; host Alumni in Falcon gym tonight

Maybe winning the South Coast Conference championship won't be so easy after all.

After destroying Santa Monica 15-1, 15-11, 15-3 last Wednesday night, the Cerritos College Women's volleyball team placed second in the Rancho Santiago Tournament this past weekend.

Cerritos fell to conference rival Pasadena City College 15-11 in the championship game.

The two will next meet Oct. 27 at Cerritos.

The Falcons play tonight in the Alumni game here at Cerritos, 7:30 p.m. Cerritos overall went 9-2 in the tournament highlighted by the play of Setter Rochelle Travers, who averaged 14 assists a game and Cruz Mendoza and Lena Pitcher who led the team in digs and aces.

In the championship game, Cerritos scored the first six points but was unable to hold off Pasadena City as they twice came back and eventually went on to win the tournament.

Co-Coach Jeanine Prindle, "We were rolling along until we made some errors that let them back in the game. Pasadena played good. They were behind twice and beat us, it'll be a tough conference." catches for 98 yards. Place Kicker, Mike Rodriquez added a 30 yard field goal in the second quarter to cap off the scoring.

The defense led by Mark Medlin and Aaron Plante, dominated San Diego Mesa as they never seriously threatened to score all night.

The bulk of the running attack was led by Louie Major who led the team with 74 yards on 16 carries. "We moved the ball all night but penaltics killed us. Our defense played really good and I'm real happy with that because we've had a few years where we haven't played good defense and to see this is really pleasing," said

Falcon Head Coach, Frank Mazzotta.


CROSS COUNTRY RUNNERS IMPROVE TIMES



Their possible future value to a pro team and the projected earning power that goes with it must not be a priority for the colleges.

Colleges should stress that these young people be a productive academic student in addition to what they offer the team.

The role of the college should be to educate the man, not make excuses, waive the rules, or grease the wheels to accommodate a possible but not probable lucrative pro career.

FOUR AGENCIES END THREE-YEAR MANHUNT ON TIP Riverside rape suspect captured in strawberry field

A three year manhunt came to an end in the strawberry fields at 8:43 a. m. this past Thursday, Sept. 23.

The suspect, an illegal alien, was sought for the kidnapping and raping a four year old girl in Temecula. Officials confirmed that he sodomized, raped, bit and hung the fouryear-old by her wrist from a tree, and tried to kill her by strangulation. The girl lived, but the suspect escaped CIA officials had been following the suspect for some time in Mexico working with the FBI, but were misled many times by the suspect.

Two detectives from Riverside County Sheriff's Department had information to suggest that the suspect would be visiting his brother here in L.A.. Working with Deputy Dave Joyce of the Norwalk Sheriff's Department, Lakewood Sheriff's Department, and Cerritos College Campus Police Officers Stephen Bedford, Richard Bukowiecki and others, the suspect along with two men were finally arrested.

Sheriff's Deputies and Campus Police officers surrounded the strawberry fields while Riverside detectives moved in and made the arrest.

There were three suspects taken into custody. One was identified as the suspect's brother and the other a friend who was said to have been hiding him.

The one matching the description was arrested and charged.
