up as museum pieces," he said.




# El Niño leaves Cerritos College campus all wet

Elvia Robbins found the aftermath of Tropical Storm Nora quite costly.

Since it had not rained in the Los Angeles area for 219 days, and the roads had suddenly became more slippery, Robbins found it necessary to prepare for what might be a very wet and dangerous - season on the freeways.

"I had to get new tires for my car," the 27year-old humanities major said.

"It's dangerous because people don't seem to slow down, they still drive like crazy. When a drop falls, they forget to keep their distance," Robbins said.

Los Angeles had been hit by a only a small edge of Nora - and perhaps just a first taste of the El Nino weather pattern that has been predicted to affect Southern California.

However, Kent Colbath, who teaches oceanography on campus, dismisses the chance for some disaster hitting the California coastline - or the college campus. Only one tropical storm has hit L.A. in the last 200 years.

"There's no firm odds that we will experience a tropical storm," Colbath said. "But there may be a chance we'll have more rainfall,"

According to Colbath, El Nino may increase the area's amount of rainfall from 14 inches to twice as much - or decrease it.

Colbath also said an El Nino can either bring extra wet weather or make it a very dry winter season. The current El Nino has not been identified.

El Nino is a freak weather effect that happens every two to seven years. According to Colbath, an El Nino is when the tradewinds blowing across the Pacific die down and the tropical current comes onto the California coast, running as far north as Pt, Conception.

"Everything, from a drought to a small rainstorm, is going to be blamed on El Nino this year," Colbath said.

"If people want to point fingers at me and say that I was the one who intitated it, yes. Because I did not feel that a former senator and newly elected associate justice was in any way, shape or form prepared to step into the position of chief justice," Stortz said.

"The question is not whether [Masselink-Oliver] did not revoke her resignation. the question is did she have the constitutional right to do it?"



# **Cerritos defense** holds on to win in major upset

Football: National champions fall to Falcons, 14-13.

Ghosts may have been in order for last Saturday's football game between the Cerritos College Falcons and the defending national champions, the Saddleback Gauchos.

It was four years ago that the Falcons had snapped the Gauchos' 20-game winning streak, and after the Falcons won in a harrowing 14-13 drama, they again snapped a winning streak of 18 games.

The Gauchos were down 14-13, and all they had to do to stretch their 18-game winning streak was to kick a 21-yard field goal with 3:18 left in the game to win over a tired Cerritos College Falcon team.

But Gaucho kicker Brett Thompson, an All-American in pre-season polls, kicked wide to the left, giving the Falcons (3-0) a major victory in both the Mission Conference standings - and in the state and national rankings.


"In a game like this, a little break will determine the winner," Saddleback head coach Bill Cunerty said. "We'll regroup after this, but our chances for another national championship are gone."

And that may be the ultimate prize for Cerritos' victory over Saddleback (1-1), who had been No. 3 in the state and 14th overall in the nation until their loss that night. With the win, the Falcons are No. 2 in the state and they will take that to Riverside Saturday,

"We're the national champions for sure now," cornerback Kareem Larrimore said 1 "They're a good team, no doubt about that. With this win, we're going to be national champions."

Falcon head coach Frank Mazzotta agreed. "We almost blew it," Mazzotta said. "But where does it rank? To beat Saddleback is always a major highlight for the season. I'll take wins anyway I get 'em....especially against Saddleback."

Offensive problems still abound For the second week in a row, the Falcon offense was stalled, relying on the defense to get them into Faicon territory.

Thanks to a defense that scores more than the offense, the Falcons have pulled themselves to a No. 2 ranking in the state.

Not bad for a team that has yet to find its offensive groove, or for a team that lost its leading rusher and scorer from the past season.

Luck can only carry a team so far though, 90... no, 99 out of 100 times Thompson buries that kick and then the Falcons go home losers.

Let's collectively hope that the football team is able to run its good fortunes into an undefeated season, after all everybody loves a winner.

Put me in, coach – I'm ready to play.

High hopes were spring eternal for the Women's volleyball team - until a rash of illnesses and injuries hit the Falcons like a Mack truck.

It got so bad, head coaches Nancy Welliver and Jeanine Prindle had to pull a freshman off redshirt status...middle hitter Shannon Lumpkin, come on down! Your're the newest addition to the

The only score from the offense came from 24-yard pass, where quarterback Matthew Sorensen connected with running back Michael Moody in the second quarter to give Cerritos a 14-7 lead.

The other touchdown came in the first quarter where defensive tackle Charles O'Neal, who intercepted a pass from Gaucho quarterback Brian Wilson and returned it for 27 yards for a 7-0 lead.

Running back Quion Austin, who had three touchdowns the week before against Golden West, was held to only 39 yards on 16 carries, and quarterback Matthew Sorensen completed only 8 passes on 22 attempts.

Worse for the Falcons, the team had only 21 yards rushing due to length sacks on Sorensen, and only 138 yards in the air. The Gauchos had gains of 139 yards on the ground and 159 yards passing.

And to top off the Falcons' offensive woes, the ball did not touch the Gauchos' side of the field until 10 minutes had passed in the game - and it came as a result of a long punt by kicker Gerritt Uttecht.

"They took the game to us; we didn't take the game to them," Mazzotta said. "Matt had no reason to keep throwing the ball on the ground. But he had a bad ankle and he got scared. But they also took the running game away from us."

Austin, who was disappointed with his performance, also took note of that.

"We struggled again," Austin said. "I think they was its defense, which did not give up the lead durscouted us good."

. The only bright spot for the Falcons was that they had no turnovers on offense, which had been a problem the previous week.

However, a major part of the Falcons' offensive problems came from penalties. The Falcons had 13 penalties which costed them a total of 105 yards.

"Every time they were in trouble, we got penalized," Mazzotta said. "I couldn't believe the penalty thing. It was unbelievably ugly. We're to be blamed for some of them though."

Saddleback had similar problems, getting penalized 10 times for a total of 104 yards.

The key penalty that killed the Gauchos happened with a minute remaining, when the Gauchos roughed Uttecht during a punt, which gave Cerritos a chance to run off the clock to finish the game.

"Roughing the kicker....now that I can't understand," Mazzotta said.

The cornerstone of the Falcons' victory however

ing the game.

"We played good against their offense, but their defense played great. It was a truly physical game," Cunerty said.

Larrimore, who left during the second quarter with leg cramps, believed that the defense was the true reason for the Falcons' victory.

"The defense had to step up," Larrimore said.

"I cramped up in the game, but I knew I had to come back. We have to have the No. 1 defense in the nation now."

Austin agreed with Larrimore.

"Our defense really stepped up and came through," Austin said.
